The International Development Research Centre is a public corporation created by the Parliament of Canada in 1970 to support research designed to adapt science and technology to the needs of developing countries. The Centre's activity is concentrated in six sectors: agriculture, food and nutrition sciences; health sciences; information sciences; social sciences; earth and engineering sciences; and communications. IDRC is financed solely by the Parliament of Canada; its policies, however, are set by an international Board of Governors. The Centre's headquarters are in Ottawa, Canada. Regional offices are located in Africa, Asia, Latin America, and the Middle East.

The information in this directory was compiled through a survey of Canadian organizations working in the field of development in Latin America and through consultation of library sources. The information is presented as provided by the respondents with only minor editorial changes. IDRC is not in a position to endorse or judge the appropriateness of information.

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#### PRESENTATION

The Canada-Latin America Annotated Development Index is an idea that took form as a result of repeated inquiries from Latin American researchers about resource groups and organizations in Canada working on Latin American development issues, particularly in the Social Sciences and in Education. This Index is a step further in providing basic information to Latin American social science research centres interested in knowing more about resources available in Canada that could be of benefit to their activities in the region.

Over the years, the work of the Education Programme in the region has encouraged both cross-regional collaboration and a closer exchange of ideas, experiences and technical and scientific resources between the North and the South. This has been an important component in the attempt to strengthen institutional research capacities and enhance the understanding of development problems that extend beyond cultural boundaries and particular disciplines. Some of the experiences in the past, through the IDRC Co-operative Programmes and through activities involving international seminars and workshops organized or supported by the Education Programme, have shown that both in Canada and across Latin America there exists an enormous potential for collaboration among these societies that may result in mutual benefits.

This Index is intended to complement the dissemination activities carried out under the regional strategy of the Education Programme in Latin America. The preparation of this material was supported through Programme Officer Delegated Authority (PODA) funds.

#### **PREFACE**

The Canada-Latin America Annotated Development Index was compiled over a six month period. It was based on a preliminary review of library and organizational sources which identified over 700 Canadian organizations working on areas related to Latin American development. From this list, 296 organizations in fields related to Education and the Social Sciences were selected and sent questionnaires.


The questionnaire was designed on the basis of other surveys and indexes in related fields. The response rate to the questionnaire was 39 percent. A total of 102 positive replies were received, 12 refusals, and 25 were returned because of changed addresses. Organizations refused either because their personnel did not think that the organization needed to be better known in Latin America or Canada, or because they did not think that their organization was appropriate for the Index. The two types of institutions who filled out the questionnaire but often indicated that the organization was not suited to the questionnaire or that the questionnaire was not suited to the organization were universities and very small groups. This trend was anticipated since the questionnaire had to be broad enough to include a wide variety of groups. The covering letter sent with the questionnaire provided the respondents with the opportunity to leave questions that did not apply to them blank, and to add additional relevant information about their organization not directly requested by the questionnaire. Also, nearly all questions left an "other" space for increased flexibility in the response. However, future surveys of this kind may consider separate questionnaires for known categories of organizations to enhance respondents' perception of relevance and perhaps improve the information gathering. Overall, the response rate to the questionnaire of 39 percent could be considered high given the average response rate, between 3 and 5 percent, for this type of survey.

The "Project Submission Information" section of the Index is intended to give a broad overview of project application procedures for organizations which may have fundding available. Information on the types of groups or projects which qualify for funding was not always available. Organizations should be contacted before project submissions are made.

Comments from some of the respondents about the survey indicated that both the questionnaire and the idea of an Index were favourably received. One of the comments received indicated that although there is considerable interest in Canada-Latin America relations, there is little support for developing relations in terms of research, joint projects, and library holdings, among other initiatives. This Index was seen as a positive step toward ameliorating this situation. A couple of respondents referred to the Index as a worthwhile endeavour and one respondent mentioned that the questionnaire was easy to fill out.

The entire index, and preliminary work including the list of 700 organizations, is contained on several IBM compatible micro-computer disks.

The author would like to thank all co-operating individuals and organizations. In particular, the author would like to thank Daniel A. Morales-Gomez, and Lisandro Galarreta, Director of the Centro de Desarrollo Rural, Peru, who provided valuable insight about project submission information that might be of interest to Latin Americans working in research or development.



ORGANIZATIONAL NAME AND PAGE LOCATION: This section lists all institutions contained in the Index and on which pages they are located.

ACRONYMS: These pages list institutional acronyms and corresponding full names for all organizations included in the Index, as well as all acronyms mentioned by groups in the Index.

ORGANIZATIONS: This section is the body of the Index. Organizations are presented alphabetically. They are presented by acronym or full name, according to the preference indicated on the questionnaire. Most of the entries are self-explanatory, however, several need elaboration. There are two especially and important items to note. First, percentages do not always add up to 100%. This inconsistency results from the percentages being estimations. The estimations are included if they provide information about the general trends in the organization. The sections affected by percentage estimations are PERSONNEL, APPROX. ANNUAL BUDGET and FUNDING SOURCES. Second, the PROJECT SUBMISSION INFORMATION section provides general information about the project application procedure, where available. Funding requests should not be made to organizations on the basis of the information here. Those organizations which may have funding available should be individually contacted prior to project submission to determine which types of groups and projects qualify for support.

Entries which deserve comment are listed below:

TYPE OF ORGANIZATION:

Although some organizations could be considered as falling into more than one category, each was placed in the category which seemed to best represent its activities. Four categories were used to describe the types of organizations: Educational Institutions, Non-

Governmental Organizations, Religious Organizations and Research

Institutions.

LANGUAGE(S):

The purpose of this entry is to inform the reader of the languages in which he/she can communicate with the organization.

OTHER OFFICE LOCATIONS:

This entry includes other office locations or places where at least

contact people are located.

**OBJECTIVES:** 

Different organizations responded differently to this entry, some provided objectives, while other provided activities or other information. However, in most cases, even if the information

provided was not strictly objectives, it was included.

PERSONNEL:

This entry is intended to give some idea as to the size and

professional composition of the organization.

### CULTURES/COUNTRIES REPRESENTED BY THE STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS:

This entry is intended to facilitate communication between

researchers and the organizations by providing information on staff

expertise with other countries/cultures.

APPROX. ANNUAL BUDGET:

There are two sections to this entry: first, the budget is broken down according to geographic priorities, and, second, according to

activity priorities. Both breakdowns are estimations.

PROJECT SUBMISSION INFORMATION:

This section is intended to give a broad overview of project funding application procedures for organizations which may have funding available. Information was not always available on which types of groups or projects are suitable for funding. <u>Organizations should be contacted before project submissions are made.</u>

SUBJECT INDEX: Organizations are listed according to activities, countries, fields, major issue areas, and types of institution.

**OFFICE LOCATIONS:** This list provides all known office locations for all of the organizations. Canadian locations are noted first, and are listed by city within an alphabetical listing of provinces. Other countries follow alphabetically. Only city and country locations are given in this list. Complete addresses can be obtained in the **INSTITUTIONS** section.

**APPENDIX:** The Appendix contains the English and French versions of the covering letter sent with the questionnaires and copies of the English and French versions of the questionnaire.

I am working as a consultant for the International Development Research Centre (IDRC) to prepare an annotated index of Canadian organizations and programmes involved with Latin America. The purpose of this Index is to provide Latin American researchers and research institutions with updated information about existing resources and expertise in Canada in regard to Latin American issues. The Index is intended for use primarily by Latin Americans. This information, however, will also be beneficial to Latin Americanists in Canada and to the general public.

IDRC is a public corporation created by the Parliament of Canada in 1970 to stimulate and support scientific and technical research by developing countries for their own benefit. The projects that the Centre supports help developing countries build the scientific competence of their institutions and their researchers so that these countries can work to solve their own problems. Research projects supported by the Centre are, therefore, identified, designed, conducted, and managed by developing-country researchers in their own countries, to meet their own priorities. Also, IDRC helps to create and supports international research networks through which developing countries can learn from each other, share common experiences, and conduct similarly designed studies in areas of mutual concern.

The organized information on Canada-Latin America development ties is extremely poor. Information is either outdated or incomplete. The inadequacy of information is limiting to Latin Americans who are interested in knowing more about particular fields of expertise in Canada, or who could be interested in exploring opportunities for Canada-Latin America co-operation.

Nearly 300 organizations are being sent this questionnaire. These include non-governmental organizations, government agencies, church groups, universities, and colleges. Their names were obtained from a variety of sources.

Completion of the enclosed questionnaire is highly appreciated. Type-written responses would be appreciated but are not necessary. Some questions may not be relevant to your organization and can be ignored, but please remember that for a Latin American, this Index will be perhaps the only source of information on your organization or programme.
