# WSIS World Summit on the Information Society ICT4D and Communications Participants Staff Evaluation December 9-12 Geneva, Switzerland

December 16, 2003



#### Introduction and Background

The first phase of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) took place in Geneva, Switzerland from Dec. 9-12, 2003. IDRC participated as a member of the official Canadian delegation to the Summit and staff and developing world partners from IDRC played a key role in the ICT4D platform adjacent to the official Summit assembly. More than 12,000 people came to Geneva to participate in the Summit and the ICT4D pavilion.

IDRC organized two workshops at the ICT4D Platform, exhibited projects at the Canadian Pavilion, completed webcast "streeter" interviews and special coverage from the Summit, and participated in numerous workshops and events to promote digital inclusion in the information society. Following the conclusion of the Summit IDRC staff who participated in the ICT4D pavillion completed an evaluation form to reflect their impressions and feedback from the Summit. The numeric rating and verbatim responses by participants follow.

## Response Patterns

Qualitative responses are listed and/or grouped to reflect all of the comments made by the participants. All quantitative responses for the survey in Annex 1 can be found in Annex 2 (21 respondents).

## 1. The thing I liked most about WSIS was:

- The energy and inspiration
- All the beautiful, great people
- ICT4D halls
- Networking
- Meeting up with old contacts over and over again
- Diversity of people and cultures
- Us
- Team building
- Meeting old friends
- The people and the initiatives from NGOs, CSOs, and other institutions
- All of us being together at once
- The opportunity to explore, in further details, what other countries are doing on ICT4D
- Networking with current and future partners, and IDRC colleagues
- Networking with partners at ICT4D platform
- The multiplier effect a reward for earlier efforts
- Space provided for side forums and incorporation of the outcome of these meetings in the WSIS Plenary (hopefullyin the final report). A feeling of solidarity globally
- Some of the very committed people I met
- People networking and ICT4D Patform
- Breadth of information
- The activities- all the participants show their interenst in what IDRC is doing as a leader

- 2. The think I liked least about WSIS was:
  - Too many things to process
  - Too expensive
  - Too tiring
  - The noise level, the poor internet access, the sheer volume of people to try and meet with
  - Too long
  - The World Bank display with cocktails, the difficulties with audio during workshops
  - Them
  - No time to attend sessions
  - Waste of funds
  - Poor connectivity on site, the noise level
  - Explaining basic things over and over again
  - Too much going on, it was like information overload, no time to cover it all
  - Like most big meetings overwhelming, cigarette smoke, no sound proofing
  - Noisy place difficult to have conversations or listen to presentations
  - Too much going on couldn't come near to capturing even a small portion
  - The feeling of being torn apart with the infinite number of meetings which leaves one with a feeling of little value added
  - The overwhelming pace of meetings, events, and presentations
  - The inability to do what I had hoped to. I was not able to meet and talk to enough partners
  - The noise levels!
  - Compromises with Canadian partners in Pavilion
- 3. Participants were asked to rank 8 dimensions of the meeting using a 10-point scale with 10 being the highest score.

The average overall rating of the conference was 8.1 out of 10.

- We're making progress
- Human network go first and are the most important issue to consider
- Mesh networking is even cooler than I imagined
- We are still the smart kids on the block, but there is a lot of noise out there
- Even with all previous difficulties, things can be done
- Something as useless as the Digital Solidarity Fund was partially adopted
- CA + Acacia intend to merge
- IDRC + OSI are the coolest dev. Organizations on the planet
- Still processing my learning
- Big is beautiful too ... but warts are easy to see
- It is possible to foster development in developing countries with the use of ICTs
- ICT4D is on the right track, that IDRC is highly viewed by southern partners
- · We are still at the head of the class, but still have lots of running to do
- 1) Multi-stakeholder partnerships are the way to go 2) Technical solutions exist and case studies of successful ICT applications are needed (real evidence) for full commitment to act
- Big conferences can actually be good if one knows how to milk them
- Summits are more about connecting with colleagues/interested parties than making decisions
- The position of the booth is important in attracting visitors great positioning of IDRC
- IDRC is a leader in the development field

#### 10. Other Comments

- Wonderful! So glad we did it!
- In all of the above, replace WSIS with ICT4D Platform. WSIS was absolutely irrelevant!
- I didn't have big expectations about the formal platform, so no big surprise. Definitely, the event didn't attract sufficient media attention. Perhaps in Tunisia ...
- We are clear leaders but need to build partnerships and continue to develop it. We must continue to distinguish ourselves!
- The organization of WSIS and ICT4D platform was poor (bad connectivity expensive as well, bad acoustics, small booth, stupid IDRC promotional policy could only "promote" IDRC in the booth)
- My experience relates mainly to the ICT4D Platform, not substantive participation of which I have no experience
- Need better promotion materials on workshops if we do this again
